Following introductions, Bruce explained that the focus of the MA Secretariat for this year is climate change and thanked Priscilla Brooks and Jack Wiggin for their leadership in building the theme. Bruce expressed his gratitude for the Working Group's work over the last two days and through each year. Prassede reviewed the consent agenda. In the June 2012 meeting summary Kathleen Leyden and Ru Morrison will clarify the names of their agencies, and Management and Finance and Secretariat Team terms of reference were removed from the consent agenda as per discussion at the Working Group meeting. Kathleen asked that RARGOM be discussed later in the agenda to ensure that an annual co-location of their and the Council's meetings be maintained to continue to implement maritime organizational collaboration.

Action Agenda

Action Plan implementation: status and accomplishments - year one

Prassede provided an update on the first year of Action Plan implementation. Committee co-chairs provided specific updates (see PowerPoint presentations posted at the URL below).

Susan Russell-Robinson provided highlights from the EcoSystem Indicator Partnership (ESIP) activities. ESIP will also take on actions 2.1.2 and 2.1.3. in the Action Plan. A survey on the use of the ESIP mapping tool was conducted. 163 telephone interviews were conducted with half from the Council and other half from outside the organization and 600-700 responses via the Survey Monkey tool were also gathered. Most respondents indicated that they are using the mapping tools to validate their own work.

Steve Couture provided an overview of the State of the Gulf of Maine (SOTGOM) reporting activities as well as the water quality protection activities pertaining to Activity 1.1.1 in the Action Plan. The State of the Gulf Editorial is now a Council Committee with Heather Breeze and Steve Couture as co-chairs. A request for proposals for the land use and commercial development theme paper was posted to

http://www.gulfofmaine.org/2/opportunities/ and distributed to the Council's internal listserves on December 12. Tim Hall announced that Fisheries and Oceans Canada has committed to continue to provide support for theme paper development and for staff time to lead the reporting effort. Bruce conveyed congratulations for the effort from his communications office. With regard to Activity 1.1.1 a stormwater training workshop was conducted by the University of New Hampshire for officials from the NS Department of Environment and members of the Ecological Activity Center in Nova Scotia. A follow-up workshop is planned to take place in Halifax in March 2013 in conjunction with the Working Group meeting.

Slade Moore provided an overview of the Gulf of Maine Council's Habitat Restoration Partnership ten-year history and status. NOAA has changed its funding focus and model so this is the last year of the Partnership's ten-year history with the Council. The Council solicited letters of interest. Responses are currently under review. There will be further discussion on future funding later during today's meeting. Peter Alexander is developing a communications plan through a contract with the Maine Coastal Program.

Climate change impacts on marine ecosystems, Scott Doney, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute

Scott Doney, WHOI, provided a presentation on the climate change theme. He presented some of the results from the soon-to-be released-for-comments (projected for mid-January 2013) *U.S. 2013 National Climate Assessment of Oceans and Marine Resources* report, which he co-authored. Economic Study

Rob Capozi and Steven Couture have been leading the economic study process. Rob gave a presentation of ongoing work including an inventory of economic literature/research in the Gulf of Maine and five draft jurisdictional fact sheets which will be peer reviewed and edited by the jurisdictions. A summary document that outlines the value of the Gulf of Maine over the last two years was also prepared. An additional summary document outlining the last ten years can be drafted and posted on the website or otherwise distributed. Bruce thanked those involved including Fisheries and Oceans Canada for its financial support to this endeavor. The Council had requested a single number that could be used as the value of the Gulf of Maine and efforts will be made to produce that number. The 136,350 jobs that were supported in 2009 and 2010 as a result of the Council's grant programs, contractors, and other investments. Caution was urged in presenting financial data on Council investments as contributions to the Gulf's economy.

Update on implementation of the Council's decision on maritime collaboration: Coastal Zone Canada event-Working Group and Council 2014 coordination

Tim Hall, Fisheries and Oceans Canada reported on the status of the Coastal Zone Canada (CZC) 2014 planning. Susanna Fuller, Ecology Action Centre and Tim Hall are the co-chairs for the event. Revitalization of coastal zone management is the theme for the conference. The conference has enjoyed wide international participation. There will be several themes within the conference potentially including Great Lakes, International Collaboration, the Arctic, Community Engagement, Youth Engagement etc. These will be determined in the coming weeks/months. There are opportunities for linkages with the Council's 2012-2017 Action Plan. The event will be convened June 15-19, 2014 in Halifax, which coincides with the opportunity to co-locate the Council's meeting during the upcoming NS Secretariat year. This is also the twentieth anniversary of the organization and event, which was first convened in Halifax in 1994 as well as the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Gulf of Maine Council. Some felt that the anniversary should be the Council's focus with limited resources.

The Department of the Interior offered financial support for the Council's twenty-fifth anniversary observance, events, and partnership panel or other collaboration opportunities. An ad hoc group to help shape the Council's contributions and participation was formed during the Working Group meeting. Volunteers for the ad-hoc group include Tim Hall, Susan Russell-Robinson, Theresa Torrent-Ellis, Betsy Nicholson, Rebecca Newhall, Prassede Vella, and Heather Breeze. It was also suggested that in addition to Working Group members and Councillors, an invitation to participate should be extended to Council committee members. The Working Group had the following suggestions:

- Field trips to shovel ready or other Council projects would be a good addition to the conference.
- Art and youth components focused on coastal zone management should be included.
- The Council's release of a plan, report, charter, commitment, or other document or project would be a good component of the events. The value of a charter or commitment may not have a value as demonstrated in the past. A nonprofit organization may be able to make the charter process more meaningful.
- A new and focused resolution for the New England Governors and Eastern Canadian Premiers may be timely to bring attention and possibly funding to the Council or at least recognize its anniversary.
- Co-locating the Working Group's and Council's June 2014 meetings.

Councillor updates

Stephen Perkins said that the USEPA National Water Program released its updated response to the climate change strategy. EPA's themes include sustainability, resiliency, and partnerships with EPA as a problem solver. Working with NH municipalities, there are stringent nitrogen limits for Great Bay cities and towns to achieve them.

Terry Holman reported that there are no specific decisions on the coming year's plans but that the USDOI is committed to partnership such as with the Gulf of Maine Council.

Jennifer Anderson said that roundtables are planned for February and March 2013 in each New England State to build partnerships between NOAA staff and the coastal management communities. The federal consistency workshop is slated for January 10 in New Castle, NH. The Planning for Meaningful Evaluation will be convened on February 7 at the Great Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve. Funding opportunities include the ROP FFO that was released on December 11 with a due date of February 11, 2013. Proposals must go through the Northeast Regional Ocean Commission (NROC), of which the Gulf of Maine Association (GOMA) serves as the fiscal agent. The Restoration Center announced that project proposals are due February 19.

Rene Pelletier reported that there was a shift from a large Republican majority in the House of Representatives to a Democratic majority in New Hampshire. Climate change and sea rise discussions are beginning. Integrated permitting for all land resource programs is underway. RGGI process will continue to be discussed. There are 274 state-owned dams and the program that manages them will no longer be supported as of May 2013.

Bruce Carlisle said that the priorities in Massachusetts are state and regional ocean planning. Massachusetts released a comprehensive ocean plan in 2009 and will be conducting an Oceans Act-required assessment of the Plan while proceeding to revise/update the plan for 2014. The Obama Administration established regional planning bodies to implement the coastal and marine spatial component of the National Ocean Policy. The NE RPB met for the first time in Portland in November 2012. NROC has been working on supporting the regional effort with NOAA funds and a grant from the Moore Foundation for data and information gathering. The focus of many discussions has been on data availability and needs. The Storm-Smart Coasts program work is ongoing with the coastal communities.

Priscilla Brooks reported CLF intervened on the side of the federal government in a lawsuit a few years ago on a fisheries industry. The decision on amendment 16 (to the Magnuson-Stevens Act) has been upheld. CLF launched an initiative to build a pubic New England Ocean Policy five-year public education partnership with National Geographic photographer. He will be diving in near-shore and offshore waters and images and stories will be shared via social media. NewEnglandOceanOdyssey.org. CLF started a campaign to build a regional ocean planning process constituency called the New England Ocean Action Network. The CLF has raised funds from Restore America's Estuaries funds to support a grants program.

Rob Capozi - the New Brunswick government has been the last three years working closely with twelve communities to develop a regional adaptation strategy with funding from NRCAN vulnerability of communities to climate change. They ended the project with a community conference. The next step involves working with them to identify adaptation solutions. A floodplain policy and regulation are in process to protect stormwater storage. They are working on wetland management framework through mapping tools such as GIS layers. LiDAR data collection is being utilized. Municipal responsibility or accountability for issuing permits.

Lee Sochasky said that there may be a major shift in the alewife fishery with Maine opening a passage in the NB border area along the St. Croix River. Environment Canada changing the funding that supporting the ACAPs. Major storms have taken a toll on communities with infrastructure in the coastal areas. Surface water classification and development integrating science, fisheries management, and other resources. Ecosystem based management integrated into the southwest New Brunswick plan. The Council's EBM document has been invaluable in the process.

Kathleen Leyden reported that following hurricane Sandy increasing numbers of communities are contacting the Maine Coastal Program for technical assistance. A community has adopted significant floodplain ordinances. Their DOE announced that they are investing in exploring wind power at a testing laboratory off Monhegan Island. Stream habitat work with Slade Moore, federal agencies, and nonprofits meant to enhance stream restoration and conservation capacity and identifying potential projects and financial and in-kind support.

Don Hudson is involved in a number of volunteer efforts including the Cornerstones of Science (library-base) and the Penobscot River Conservation Trust, the latter of whom was recently involved in a significant dam removal project. The Veazie Dam is being assessed as is the upstream capacity. Dam removal is slated for next year. He is working with a group that will create an organization for the Allagash watershed. Don is working with a Maine sister state in Japan and with a university in Hirosaki. He is also working on a trail organization reconnecting Pangea subcontinents with the nations in their current geographic areas.

David Millar reported that on the Scotian Shelf efforts have been completed as part of the integrated ocean management with spatial risk assessment to identify areas for intervention. A marine advisory committee was established in southwest NB to convene stakeholders to discuss marine protected area network planning. The Habitat management program is being reorganized pursuant to changes in the Fisheries Act there is a focus on recreation, commercial, and aboriginal species. Efforts are underway to establish standards to protect habitats, as

well as a species at risk program to protect right whales, fishing gear entanglement reduction/elimination, listing salmon species.

Considerations for fund development

W. Donald Hudson, Jr., and Lee Sochasky

Don Hudson explained that the ad hoc funding group has been working with David Keeley since the Council's June 2012 meeting. The notice of intent to apply policy was formed years ago to be able to identify any conflicts with partner or other organizations who may also be seeking support from the same source. Some Councillors have expressed concern about feeling beholden to outside private funds supporting the Council's work. He does not feel that there is really a way to address that concern generally. The group is looking at a non-competitive way to find funding through establishing program offices in federal agencies in Canada and the US and this may be a way to address funding the Council's management needs. This office would become the Council's "home" where its staff (currently contractors) would be "housed." He said that a key part of the Great Waters Initiative is intended to accomplish this arrangement. Don will address his recommendations during the core services agenda item. He will be presenting the group's recommendations on addressing the Council's core services.

Funder fora are part of the group's ongoing work. Helping private funders see the nature of the work vs. the governmental participants is a key element. Success stories are a key part of this process. The process has begun in the region by David Keeley to reconvene the funders in the Gulf of Maine region to stimulate interest in supporting the Council's Action Plan activities. Don stated several conversations have occurred since the briefing note was drafted. The ad hoc group is asking the Council for contractual support for David Keeley. Some feel that the Council has to look at what is fundable and a current, key issue. A list of Council projects that can be funded should be drafted. There is a concern that the focus is shifting from what is in the Action Plan activities to issues for which private and other funding is available. There are concerns about government being involved in private fundraising, given that their mandates come from legislatures and parliament. Although GOMA is primarily responsible the line between GOMA and the Council is not clear to everyone. It raises issues with Canadian federal participants. Environment Canada cannot serve on the Gulf of Maine Association board of directors if it is providing funding to the organizations. Action Plan implementation: Plan structure to organizational structure – committee organization Ad Hoc Group report to the Council

Prassede presented work on aligning the organization's structure with the current Action Plan, according to the June 2012 Council decision and action items. A committee organization ad hoc group was established and a series of calls with committee co-chairs and council leads to address the status of each committee, discuss its role in the Action Plan, and identify co-chairs, membership capacity, and other gaps including "orphaned" Action Plan activities were convened. Some groups that were active during the last Action Plan cycle are now dormant because of lack of leadership and no relevant Action Plan activities. The results are documented in the spreadsheet that the Councillors received. A Plan of Action that highlights resource availability, needs, and support required from each committee for Action Plan implementation has been distributed to committees and two have responded. Theresa Torrent-Ellis presented an example of this process developed for Gulfwatch, a long-term Council program. She explained that the committee has been exploring possible collaboration with other monitoring programs (mainly NOAA's Musselwatch) and a laboratory intercalibration process is underway. Prassede then explained that in terms of reporting, committees will prepare one- or two-page summaries of their accomplishments and provide annual

presentations on ongoing work, needs, etc. to the Council,. The Habitat Conservation and Aquatic Habitat Monitoring subcommittees have been shelved for now due to a lack of role in the Action Plan. The Habitat Restoration subcommittee should be restored to committee status. The Gulf of Maine Mapping Initiative (GOMMI) has also been dormant for a long time and efforts have been made by Tim Hall and Betsy Nicholson, co-chairs, CMSP committee to examine the possibility of rolling its former tasks into CMSP. However this was not deemed to be viable at this time (no one to take the lead in Canada and no funds in the US) and instead the CMSP will take on the Action Plan activity that is tasked to GOMMI and address any mapping interests and questions . Kathleen offered the Coastal Program's NOAA fellow to help with any mapping needs. A concern was also raised on the apparent demise of the Habitat Conservation Subcommittee. Prassede explained that these entities are dormant now and the status can be changed when interest, leadership, and other capacities change. The Sustainable Tourism committee was integrated into the Sustainable Industry and Communities with Rob Capozi and Theresa Torrent-Ellis as co-chairs who over the next six months will be working on defining goals, restoring membership, and developing a work plan. Gulf of Maine Times

Theresa Torrent-Ellis presented an overview of the *Times*. Due to lack of continued funding since 2007 a consistent publication schedule could not be maintained. Costs are at the lowest level e with electronic publication and a flexible editor contractor who pays contributing writers from her contract. Currently, there is no funding and the contractor has not been paid in nearly a year. The FY 2007 budget of \$106,319, (included paper publication and mailing) is now \$9,300. Theresa provided a review of other processes and changes to be considered for the *Times* including funding challenges and recognizing the value of the publication. The *Times* is not only electronic but will now be enhanced/changed to produce monthly editions with one or two articles distributed via ConstantContact. Another key change is being explored for New Hampshire to provide an in-kind editor vs. paying dues. A new budget will be developed for next year. Theresa requested that the Times be included in the core services budget. Cindy clarified that Management and Finance will be developing the draft budget and since additional -funds in the current core services budget are not available additional support would be needed. It is recognized as an important part of the Council functions and will await further information.

Secretariat Team Terms of Reference

Purpose

- b. **Chair:** The Working Group Chair facilitates the Secretariat Team's calls, meetings, and processes.
- c. **Meetings:** The Secretariat Team is expected to conduct the majority of its business through telecommunications and email. It may meet as needed and agreed upon by its membership.
- d. **Decisions:** The Team has limited decision-making abilities. It may take action on matters directed to its attention. Decisions will be made by consensus. The Secretariat Team will forward its decisions as recommendations to the body that requested its involvement.
- e. **Support**: The Council Coordinator, Gulf of Maine Association Executive Director, and the Development Coordinator provide support to the Secretariat Team and participate in its discussions as needed.

Background (required):

The Gulfwatch chemical contaminants monitoring program is continuing in its 22nd year, albeit being conducted now with severely reduced and complicated funding, and staff shortages. The challenges notwithstanding, many thanks are due to current WG members for their assistance finding funding for the past several years (2010-date). A summary of the program's status and key points follows:

A. Sampling, Analyses and Archiving

(1) Sample analysis for 2011 season

Metals have been analyzed and reported by Battelle labs as per program requirements (this requires confirmation by Steve Jones and Cindy Krum who set-up the contract).

Organics for New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services have been analyzed and reported for 2010, 2011 & a few 2012 samples taken in the spring. Organic analysis of the 2011 samples for the remainder of the jurisdictions has been started and is now in progress. The process for establishing a contract for this work was very laborious and scrupulous, with the final, signed established document received during last week of May 2013. The ETA for the remainder of the data for organics is end of June this year. Jamie Aube is working with Cindy Krum on the logistics & financials for this organics contract.

(submitted by Jamie Aube, EC, Moncton)

(2) Samples for 2012 season

Samples collected in 2012 are processed but are archived at EC Moncton and BIO, NS, for future analyses. Eventually, all samples from this year will be in one location for preservation. So far, there are no monies available for analyses for 2012 and upcoming 2013 samples.

(3) Samples for 2013 season

The decision was made at the February meeting of the Canadian Gulfwatch members that sampling in 2013 would proceed, again with only sample processing and archiving following the collections. The new sampling design will be followed, as per Jones (pers. comm.). It is assumed that samples from the New England states will also be collected and mostly archived.

(4) Status of recently archived tissue samples

Most of the 2010 & 2011 samples for organics are in the EC Moncton freezer, including those for metals replicates; metal composites were sent to Battelle lab in US for analysis (J. Aube, pers. comm.). All 2012 samples are now at BIO (needs confirmation from Shawn Roach, DFO.).

B. The Three Phase Gulfwatch Program Business Plan - Summary

This work was largely supported by Environment Canada (Atlantic Region) and the Maine State Planning Office.

- (1) Gulfwatch Program Business Plan Phase 1 report was completed by Dr. Steve Jones, UNH. January 2013. The report covers the historical program and evolution of monitoring design, the existing program design and assumptions and justifications, an analysis of the existing plan, new design and costs, partnerships, proposed new publications, and review panel recommendations. The primary output of the report is the recommendation for a newly designed program with fewer sites, staggered sampling, the dependence upon the archives, and the inclusion of several key chemical contaminants of emerging concern. A basic budget of approx. 62K, and 80K in-kind, is required for the current revised program, without new chemicals (Jones estimates, 2013).
- (2) Gulfwatch Program Plan Phase 2 and 3, Emerging Chemical Contaminants in the Gulf of Maine. This report was completed by Dr. David Buck, Biodiversity Research Institute (BRI), Gorham, ME in May 2013. Highlights are a description of recommended emerging chemicals to consider monitoring, other sentinel species to consider, budgetary needs, the need for outreach and education on emerging chemical

contaminants, and recommended publications and workshop. Of special note is the proposed budget for emerging contaminants monitoring and the ancillary activities for one year – 216.5 K.

C. Other Topics - Meetings, Chairmanship, Travel Support, Membership

- (1) A meeting of the Canadians was held in February and reported on at the March WG meeting in Halifax NS, where an update on the whole program was also presented.
- (2) Gulfwatch has approached Dr. Jim Shine, Harvard School of Public Health, who has expressed some interest in taking on the position of Us Co-Chair. He is planning to attend the June meeting. Many thanks are due to CK for his many contributions, as he steps down as Co-Chair but stays on as a Gulfwatch member.
- (3) Support for some Gulfwatch members attending meetings is needed. Thanks are due to Susan Robinson, USGS, for travel support for the Canadian Co-Chair.
- (4) Recruitment The group still needs more members, so this is an ongoing activity.

D. Ongoing Collaboration with Other Programs (Oct 2012)

- (1) Collaboration with ESIP:
 - Continuing. No individual assigned to this task from GW. Un-funded
- (2) Collaboration with NOAA: Ongoing dialogue with NOAA about NOAA-in house analyses for inorganics (metals).

F. Recent Talks/Outreach

(1) Steve Jones

A Gulfwatch presentation was made to the Coastal Research Volunteer Program of the NH Sea Grant; they provided significant volunteer hours in helping to complete the NH sampling that was not done by NHDES during fall, 2012. We discussed the program and the past results. They appreciated what they did for the program, providing critical information on the health of the NH Seacoast ecosystem. In addition, the CRV volunteers helped sample and process mussels from Brave Boat Harbor, Maine. In summary, the CRV helped significantly with Gulfwatch in two states.

(2) Peter Wells

A presentation was made in May on Health of the Oceans to the 2013 Oceans Governance Class of the International Ocean Institute, Halifax. The talk incorporated Gulfwatch information and data.


